SEEING THE FUTURE


Many sight disorders cause gradually worsening vision that can, for a time, go unnoticed. For some conditions, such as glaucoma, early detection can help prevent blindness. To best care for New Yorkers with glaucoma, MEETH recently opened the 7,500-square-foot Glaucoma Center.

"Glaucoma is one of the leading causes of blindness in our country," said Celso Tello, MD, an internationally renowned glaucoma expert and Chair of Ophthalmology at both Lenox Hill Hospital and MEETH. "The disease is often diagnosed in its later stages because patients lose peripheral vision without realizing it. The goal of the Glaucoma Center is to create the opportunity for more patients to access state-of-theart diagnostics and receive care from specialists trained to identify the disease process in its earliest stages."

Although glaucoma is incurable, options are available for controlling the disease and preserving vision. Providers at the Glaucoma Center use advanced technology to conduct eye exams and deliver follow-up medical or surgical treatments. Minimally invasive options include iStent and canaloplasty. These procedures are safe, reduce the risk of complications and improve recovery times when compared with traditional glaucoma surgery.

Glaucoma Center physicians are committed to advancing the science of glaucoma treatment and collaborate with international institutions to bring diagnosis and innovative care to New York.

Today, the spirit of innovation lives on in a new space on the fifth floor of MEETH, where NISMAT orthopedic surgeons, physical therapists, exercise scientists, biomechanists, engineers, nutritionists, athletic trainers and conditioning specialists provide personalized care. The new facility houses:

- physical therapy space for patients recovering from surgery or injury;
- specialty clinics for runners, golfers and tennis players;
- space to conduct comprehensive fitness assessments and conduct individualized nutrition consultation: and
- space dedicated for high-level research into complex sportsrelated injuries and rehabilitation techniques.
